
Activities and programs conducted to sensitize on Constitutional obligations: values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens

The program witnessed active participation from teachers and students across various departments, fostering awareness about the democratic process and the role of voting in shaping the nation's leadership.








2. NATIONAL CONSTITUTIONAL DAY
